# Rule 11-18 Overview: Reduction of Risk from Air Toxic Emissions at Existing Facilities

### Where is Rule 11-18 in the PTCA Plan?

Rule 11-18 is an integral part of the PTCA Plan. Two strategies contain eight individual actions that pertain to Rule 11-18.

- 1. **Fuel Refining Strategy 4:** Reduce Exposure and Public Health Impacts from Toxic Air Contaminants Emitted by the Fuel Refining Sector
- 2. Commercial and Industrial Sources Strategy 4: Large Industrial Sources

Type of actions for Rule 11-18 in the PTCA Plan

- Improving the overall implementation process (for the rule as a whole)
- Implementing Rule 11-18 at individual facilities



# **Overview of Rule 11-18 in the PTCA Plan**

### Improving the Overall Implementation Process for the Rule

- **FR 4.1** Amend Rule 11-18 to improve stringency, efficiency, transparency, and public engagement
  - 2-step amendment process:
    - 1. efficiency, transparency, and public engagement
    - 2. assessing stringency

### **Implementing Rule 11-18 at Individual Facilities**

- FR 4.2 Prioritize Implementation of Rule 11-18 for Chevron
- FR 4.3 Implement Rule 11-18 at Chemtrade
- FR 4.4 Implement Rule 11-18 at all other fuel refining and non-fuel refining facilities
   + provide regular updates on implementation
- **C&I 4.1** Implement Rule 11-18 at Large Facilities (non-fuel refining)
  - **C&I 4.2 -** Levin Terminal;
  - C&I 4.3 Gold Bond (New NGC, Inc.);
  - **C&I 4.4 -** West Contra Costa County Landfill;
  - BNSF; and other facilities



### **Overview of Rule 11-18**

### Purpose

Ensure facilities that emit toxic air contaminants (TACs) do not pose an unacceptable health risk to nearby residents, workers, or students

### **Defining Key Terms**

- **Toxic Air Contaminants (TACs):** air pollutants that cause or are suspected of causing cancer, birth defects, or other serious harms
- Health Risk: the potential for adverse human health effects resulting from exposure to the types of toxic air contaminants released into the air
  - Health effects range from relatively mild temporary conditions, such as eye or throat irritation, shortness of breath, or headaches, to permanent and serious conditions, such as birth defects, cancer or damage to lungs, nerves, liver, heart, or other organs



### **Overview of Rule 11-18**

### **Additional Key Terms**

- Health Risk Assessment (HRA): An analysis that estimates the potential for increased likelihood of health risk for individuals in the affected population that may be exposed to emissions of one or more toxic air contaminants
- Risk Reduction Plan (RRP): A document that identifies, among other things, sources, quantities, and causes of emissions responsible for exceedance of any of the risk action levels (set forth in Section 11-18-221) and details risk reduction measures that will be implemented to reduce risk.
- **Risk Reduction Measures:** Practices that reduce toxic air contaminant emissions or that reduce health risks at the facility being evaluated
  - including changes to production processes, feedstocks, product formulations, emission point locations, emissions capture and dispersion mechanisms, and the installation of toxics best available control technology (TBARCT) or other control devices



# **Importance of Rule 11-18**

Why is Rule 11-18 important?

- It applies to **existing** facilities
  - Affects a large number of facilities, many of which are in Bay Area communities that face a variety of public health challenges
- It is the most comprehensive and health protective regulation in the United States that addresses community health impacts and risk from toxics
  - Establishes limits for cancer risk
  - Establishes limits for chronic hazard and acute hazard risk



# **Key Steps to Implement Rule 11-18**

**Emissions Inventory** 

• Air District updates and approves toxic emissions inventory for a given facility

- Health Risk Assessment
- Air District finalizes modeling protocol to input into the health risk model
- Air District runs model and produces Health Risk Assessment (HRA)
- Public review and comment
- Finalize and compare risk results to rule thresholds
- District determines if a Risk Reduction Plan (RRP) is required

### Risk Reduction Plan

- If required, facility prepares Risk Reduction Plan (RRP)
- Air District review
- Public review and comment
- Facility implements controls from Risk Reduction Plan (RRP) to reduce risk




# **Facility Role in Rule 11-18 Implementation**

A facility's role in Rule 11-18 implementation includes the following:

- Submit data for emissions inventory (e.g., material usage data and other information)
- Consultation on Emissions Inventory
  - Including assumptions and calculations made by Air District
- Public comment on the following documents (should the facility choose to comment)
  - Draft Health Risk Assessment (HRA)
  - Draft Risk Reduction Plan (RRP)
- If a Risk Action Level from the rule is exceeded, a Risk Reduction Plan (RRP) is required
  - Facility needs to submit a proposed RRP for the Air District to review
  - Upon Air District approval of RRP, the facility must implement the risk reduction measures
