Engaging to Secure Climate Investments for the Bay Area

 Staff began working with stakeholders in East Oakland in 2015 to develop specific urban greening project ideas for the State Climate grant programs that achieves both Greenhouse Gas (GHG)-reduction and air pollution impact/local health benefits to community

 Based on this work, a \$4.1M capital grant application for a San Leandro Creek Urban Greenway project was submitted in 2017 by the County of Alameda Flood Control District. The Air District was listed as a key community engagement partner


Engaging to Secure Climate Investments for the Bay Area (Cont.)

 In 2017 the State also opened a separate climate investment grant program entitled the Transformative Climate Community Program (TCCP)

• The West Oakland Environmental Indicators Project (WOEIP) requested the Air District be the lead for a \$170,000 urban biofilter/vegetative buffer planning grant application.

 Both grants were awarded including three other urban greening grants in the region and another TCCP planning grant.

San Leandro Creek Urban Greenway, Phase 1
















Marcus Garvey Commons Urban Biofilter Project



Staff Recommendations

Recommend Board of Directors:

- Accept and appropriate funds from the County of Alameda Flood Control District for the California Natural Resources Agency Urban Greening Grant in an amount not to exceed \$109,000 in support of the San Leandro Creek Urban Greenway, Phase 1 project in East Oakland; and
- Accept and appropriate funds from the California
 Department of Conservation for the State Transformative
 Climate Community Program in an amount not to exceed
 \$170,000 in support of the West Oakland Marcus Garvey
 Commons Project.
