Public Comment on Non-Agenda Matters, Pursuant to Government Code Section 54954.3 Speakers wishing to address the Board on non-agenda matters will be heard at the end of the agenda, and each will be allowed up to three minutes to address the Board at that time.

Members of the Board may engage only in very brief dialogue regarding non-agenda matters, and may refer issues raised to District staff for handling. In addition, the Chairperson may refer issues raised to appropriate Board Committees to be placed on a future agenda for discussion.

Public Comment on Agenda Items The public may comment on each item on the agenda as the item is taken up. Public Comment Cards for items on the agenda must be submitted in person to the Clerk of the Boards at the location of the meeting and prior to the Board taking up the particular item. Where an item was moved from the Consent Calendar to an Action item, no speaker who has already spoken on that item will be entitled to speak to that item again.

Speakers may speak for up to three minutes on each item on the Agenda. However, the Chairperson or other Board Member presiding at the meeting may limit the public comment for all speakers to fewer than three minutes per speaker, or make other rules to ensure that all speakers have an equal opportunity to be heard. The Chairperson or other Board Member presiding at the meeting may, with the consent of persons representing both sides of an issue, allocate a block of time (not to exceed six minutes) to each side to present their issue.

The Committee met on Monday, November 25, 2019, and approved the minutes of April 22, 2019.

The Committee reviewed and discussed the staff presentation Fourth Quarter Financial Report – Fiscal Year Ending June 2019.

The Committee reviewed and discussed the staff presentation First Quarter Financial Report – Fiscal Year Ending 2020.

Damian Breen, Deputy Air Pollution Control Officer of Technology, introduced Mark Gage, Air Quality Engineer, who gave the staff presentation *Public Hearing to Consider Adoption of Proposed Amendments to Regulation 12: Miscellaneous Standards of Performance, Rule 15: Petroleum Refining Emissions Tracking; and Approval of Filing a Notice of Exemption from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)*, including: current annual emissions inventories; basis for change; proposed emissions reporting requirements; rule development; Air District impact; California Environmental Quality Act; and recommended actions.

Public Comments

Public comments were given by Bob Brown, Western States Petroleum Association (WSPA); and Jed Holtzman, 350 Bay Area.

Board Comments

The Board and staff discussed the Air District's Stationary Source Committee's support of the recommendation that Air District emissions reporting deadlines coordinate with those of state-level regulations; WSPA's request to modify the proposed regulation to delay implementation by one year, and the Air District's response to that request; which party serves as the arbiter regarding inventory discrepancies submitted by facilities regulated under the Cap and Trade program; existing penalties for facilities' non-compliance with submission deadlines; and varying Air District staff-proposed reporting deadlines for Criteria Pollutants and Toxic Air Contaminants and the consideration of anticipated burden on facilities.

PRESENTATION

15. Climate Protection Update

Jack P. Broadbent, Executive Officer/Air Pollution Control Officer, introduced Abby Young, Climate Protection Manager, who gave the staff presentation *Climate Protection Update*, including: recent climate studies; impacts in the Bay Area; California's response; meeting the 2020 target; getting to 2050; strategic approach; methane rule development; key initiatives; and moving forward.

Public Comments

Public comments were given by Jed Holtzman, 350 Bay Area.

Board Comments

The Board and staff discussed factors that have caused fluctuations in levels of GHG emissions over decades; the need for smaller cities to receive technical assistance in targeting pollutants; the extent to which the Air District should be able to regulate commercial and residential use of backup diesel generators; the anticipated demand for electric vehicle (EV) charging stations and battery storage; the request that the Board receives regular updates about the progress of the Air District's Diesel Free by '33 initiative; Bay Area GHG emissions versus statewide GHG emissions; the suggestion that the Air District collects data on the impact that telecommuting has on vehicle miles traveled and best travel-

demand-management practices for employers; the suggestion that the Air District makes available financial incentives for schools to get students to walk, rather than be transported in motor vehicles; the suggestion that the Air District collaborates with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission to create subsidies for more frequent bus availability to increase ridership; the need to increase the number of EV supercharging stations in the Bay Area to reduce range anxiety; the suggestion that the Air District officially prioritizes climate protection activities and racial equity in disadvantaged communities; the request that Air District staff prioritize the targets established in the Air District's 2017 Clean Air Plan, and assigns dates to those programs and projects that currently lack target dates; the suggestion that providing matching funds for bicycle and transit improvement projects may incentivize jurisdictions; a request for a status update on the Air District's Clean Cars for All program; the request that the Board and Air District staff discuss preventative actions that can be taken to reduce emissions (i.e., clearing brush, improved distribution of jobs and housing, identify deficiencies in public transit systems and subsequent low ridership, identify factors that force people to drive, staggering operational hours of various industries to relieve traffic congestion, and charging grids for heavy-duty vehicles); finding a balance between positive and negative perspectives regarding the future of air quality and climate change; the need for stronger regional collaboration; the suggestion that more stringent penalties be imposed on Spare the Air days; persisting challenges in improving first/last mile connections to transit; the suggestion that healthy lifestyles and methods of active transportation be rewarded, versus incentivizing new technologies that require changes in behavior; and the Air District's Commuter Benefits program, an update on which Air District staff plan to bring to the Board at a future meeting.

Vice Chair Sinks reported that the Air District is one of several plaintiffs that have taken legal action against the Lehigh Cement Company, LLC, at the request of the U.S Environmental Protection Agency. The Plaintiffs seek an injunction ordering Lehigh to substantially reduce, and mitigate past excess emissions of, their emissions of sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxides at their Portland cement manufacturing plants in the United States, one of which is located in Cupertino.

OTHER BUSINESS

18. Report of the Executive Officer/Air Pollution Control Officer

Mr. Broadbent discussed the following:

- Vanessa Johnson, Manager of Executive Operations, initiated the extension of the Board member compensation program, making it possible for Board members to be reimbursed for using active transportation methods to get to and from Air District meetings subject to the Ralph M. Brown Act.
- A summary of ozone seasons and current winter Particulate Matter_{2.5} (Spare the Air) seasons was displayed.
- Brian Bunger, District Counsel, was elected President-Elect of the Air and Waste Management Association for 2020 and will be President in 2021.
- The retirement of Eric Stevenson, former Director of Meteorology and Measurement, was announced. Mr. Stevenson was recognized for his many years of service.
- Greg Nudd, Deputy Air Pollution Control Officer gave additional comments about the lawsuit against Lehigh Cement Company, LLC, noting that the development of this litigation began in 2015.

19. Chairperson's Report

Chair Rice announced that the next Board meeting will be the annual Board of Directors Retreat in Cupertino. Mr. Broadbent added that although the retreat was originally scheduled for January 15, 2020, Air District staff requested that it instead be held on January 29, 2020. RECOMMENDED ACTION

The Board of Directors will consider authorizing the Executive Officer/APCO to enter into a contract with Environmental Audit, Inc., in an amount not to exceed \$168,900, for California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) review consultant services for the Schnitzer Steel Ocean-Going Vessels Increase Project (Air District Application No. 29411).

BACKGROUND

This contract includes services for developing and preparing Initial Studies, Negative Declarations, Environmental Impact Reports, or other CEQA-related documents as specified by Air District staff. The Air District solicited bids from consultants that can demonstrate extensive experience with CEQA analysis and CEQA document development/preparation as related to air quality permits and air quality planning.

Schnitzer Steel submitted a permit application for its Ocean-Going Vessels (OGV) Increase Project (Air District Application # 29411). Schnitzer Steel is seeking to increase the allowable number of ship calls at Schnitzer Steel's scrap metal recycling facility in Oakland, California from 26 ship calls to 32 ship calls per calendar year.

The Air District will have the role of CEQA lead agency for this project.

DISCUSSION

The Air District issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) for CEQA Review Consultant Services on October 10, 2019. The RFP was directly sent to approximately 40 consulting firms who are known to have expertise in the specific technical areas, and posted on the Air District's website. During the one-month period that the RFP was open, the Air District responded to written questions from three consulting firms and posted these responses on the Air District's website. Upon closing, four proposals were received.

The Environmental Audit, Inc. proposal was evaluated under the Air District's RFP evaluation procedures and received the highest average score (89 on a 100-point scale).

BUDGET CONSIDERATION/FINANCIAL IMPACT

None. The Air District will seek full reimbursement from Schnitzer Steel for the costs associated with this project.

BACKGROUND

On August 21, 2018, the Air District issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) to provide security services for the Air District. A three-member evaluation panel reviewed the two submitted proposals and recommended Resolute Security Group, Inc. (Resolute), as the vendor most advantageous to the Air District based on the evaluation criteria stated in the RFP. Resolute was chosen as the vendor. A contract agreement in the amount of \$100,000 with Resolute was entered for a three-year period from October 17, 2018, to October 16, 2021.

Currently, the IT infrastructure requires minor upgrades and maintenance that are best executed with assistance from vendors with specialized experience. Air District staff is recommending amending the contract with a current vendor who assisted with the original Headquarters infrastructure installation, and who has been qualified through the Air District's Request for Qualification (RFQ) process.

DISCUSSION

Over the past year, the Air District has worked with IT Help, LLC on small IT infrastructure projects such as adding computer storage capacity, replacing failed components, and providing technical support during scheduled power outages.

Prior to executing a multi-year agreement with this vendor, the Air District evaluated available vendor resources through the competitive process under RFQ 2019-15. Three vendors provided qualified submissions. The table below summarizes the average scores for each vendor under each evaluated category:

This year's contribution is roughly \$96,000 higher than last year. BARC staff member salaries were partially offset by an external grant last year. As a result, the Air District contribution increased more than would be expected due to inflation.

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT Between METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION COMMISION and BAY AREA AIR QUALITY MANAGEMENT DISTRICT Regarding FY 2019-20 BAY AREA REGIONAL COLLABORATIVE (BARC) STAFFING SUPPORT

This Cooperative Agreement is entered as of July 1, 2019 by and between the METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION (hereinafter "MTC") and the BAY AREA AIR QUALITY MANAGEMENT DISTRICT (hereafter "BAAQMD") collectively referred to herein as "the Parties".

RECITALS

WHEREAS, MTC and the BAAQMD, as members of the Bay Area Regional Collaborative (BARC) are committed to supporting BARC staffing on behalf of the BARC member agencies; and

WHEREAS, MTC has committed funding of \$351,067 to fund the BARC Executive Director and a BARC Program Coordinator and some associated costs for fiscal year 2019-20 to support:

- Providing policy analysis, supporting the BARC's regional goals, developing and assisting in the completion of BARC initiatives, and helping to coordinate regional policymaking by promoting cohesive and collaborative relationships among the four regional agencies;
- Overseeing BARC policy efforts related to climate protection, sea level rise and adaptation strategies;
- Assisting with the coordination and integration of air quality and adaptation issues in the next Plan Bay Area (Sustainable Communities Strategy) as the plan evolves into a more comprehensive regional effort;
- Working closely with BAAQMD staff and other regional agency partners in the
 development and implementation of collaborative projects supporting local jurisdictions
 in meeting carbon free energy goals and campaigns to eliminate use of diesel fuels.
 Particular focus will be on working with BAAQMD staff in a project focused on the
 decarbonization of existing buildings.
- Working closely with BAAQMD and MTC/ABAG in addressing the nexus of land use planning, transportation planning, and air quality in vulnerable and disadvantaged communities as directed by Assembly Bill (AB) 617. Particular focus will be on helping to implement elements of the West Oakland Action Plan that pertain to meeting transportation-related greenhouse-gas reduction goals;
- Working with the BARC member agencies to better coordinate capacity-building, community participation, and outreach efforts in the Bay Area's most vulnerable and disadvantaged communities;
- Assisting in the participation of BARC member agency staff in the Government Alliance of Race and Equity (GARE) yearlong learning program;
- Assisting the BARC Chair in preparing agendas, supporting materials and minutes for BARC action, and;
- Assisting with other initiatives as directed by the BARC Chair and Governing Board; and
- Supporting the implementation of BARC work plan through strategic activities provided by appropriate consultants.

WHEREAS, BAAQMD has committed \$351,067 for the above stated purpose, with BARC member agency the Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC) providing additional supporting funds, for a total project budget of \$877,667, to conduct tasks listed above, in addition to any others jointly agreed to between MTC and BAAQMD;

NOW, THEREFORE, MTC and BAAQMD hereto agree as follows:

1. The BAAQMD agrees to provide MTC with three hundred and fifty-one thousand and sixty-seven dollars (\$351,067) within 120 days of the effective date of this Agreement. Payment shall be made to MTC as the address listed below:

In the event that there is, for any reason, a lower cost for the Executive Director and Program Coordinator and consultant services than the full budgeted \$351,067, MTC will reimburse the BAAQMD a proportional amount based on the contributions to the overall budget made by MTC and BAAQMD. As a smaller overall contributor, BCDC will not be reimbursed on a proportional basis for any remaining balance of the full budgeted \$877,667.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

BACKGROUND

The Bay Area Air Quality Management District (Air District) adopted Rule 11-18, Reduction of Risk from Air Toxic Emissions at Existing Facilities on November 15, 2017. As part of its implementation, the Air District uses air dispersion modeling and the latest science from the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA) to evaluate health risks to communities from permitted facilities.

If a health risk exceeds a Rule 11-18 risk action level, the facility will be required to either:

- (A) Reduce all health risks below the final risk action levels; or
- (B) Install best available retrofu control technology for toxics (TBARCT) on all significant sources.

The final risk action levels are a cancer risk of 10 in a million, chronic hazard index of 1.0, and acute hazard index of 1.0.

The Rule 11-18 Implementation Steps are: (1) screen facilities, (2) validate data, (3) conduct health risk assessment (HRA), (4) approve risk reduction plans (RRP), and (5) implement risk reduction neasures. The public will have the opportunity to comment on the draft HRA and the draft RRP before these reports are finalized.

DISCUSSION

Process and Timeline

As described in the Rule 11-18 Implementation Procedures, the Air District uses prioritization scores to screen and classify sites as high priority, low priority, or exempt. High priority sites are further separated into two phases (Phase I or Phase II). High priority facilities with the highest potential for health risks are in Phase I. Phase II includes all other non-exempt high priority facilities. The Air District conducted the initial screening assessment in June 2018. After initial inventory corrections, the Air District identified 35 Phase I facilities and about 300 Phase II facilities. A new screening assessment is underway, and the Air District has identified one additional Phase I facility. The number of Phase II facilities remains about 300.

The Air District has completed the preliminary HRA for one facility. Preliminary results indicate that health risks from this site exceed the Rule 11-18 risk action levels (RALs) and that a risk reduction plan (RRP) will be required. The preliminary HRA report has been sent to the facility for the required 90-day review period. The Air District expects to post this HRA for public comment in March 2020.

HRAs are underway for three additional sites. Start meets on a weekly basis to review progress on the data validation process for the remaining 31 sites. The data request for the new Phase I site is being prepared and will be sent to the facility before the end of the year. For the refineries, staff are currently validating stack parame er data and 1-hour emission inventories. The annual emission inventories are being validated through the Rule 12-15 process. The HRAs for the refineries will begin after completion of the newly liquids study and the related emission inventory updates.

Overall, staff expects to require HRAs for about 30 of the Phase I sites. Most of the Phase I HRAs will be published by the end of 2020.

Actions to Date

To implement the rule, the Air District convened a Rule 11-18 Implementation Workgroup to ensure transparency, provide industry and community perspectives, and facilitate communication with affected communities during the implementation of Rule 11-18. This workgroup includes representatives from environmental and health organizations, industry groups, refineries, and Air District staff. The workgroup has had four meetings to date. Recent discussion topics include: guidance documents, one-hour emission inventories, context for HRA reports, and public noticing plans. The Air District is currently reviewing workgroup comments on guidance documents and expects to post these guidance documents to the web site soon.

The implementation of Rule 11-18 has led to several infrastructure improvements. The Air District developed a new data management process for high priority facilities that will increase accuracy of annual toxic air contaminant (TAC) emission inventories, add new one-hour TAC emission inventories, and collect all necessary input data for comprehensive HRAs. This process provides regulated facilities with the information needed to understand the basis for their current Air District emission inventory; to identify potentially significant emissions; to easily request corrections to inaccurate data; to provide missing data; and allows for data improvement and validation by Air District staff. The Air District has also updated our fee structure in Regulation 3 to meet cost recovery goals for the staff time needed to improve TAC inventories, conduct or review HRAs, and approve RRPs. In addition, staff updated the Air District website by reorganizing page locations, consolidating documents, and adding new information related to Rule 11-18 implementation.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

BACKGROUND

Communities in and around Milpitas, near a cluster of waste handling facilities, have experienced air quality and odor issues for many years. These racilities include the Newby Island Landfill and associated composting facility, operated by Republic Services; the San Jose-Santa Clara Regional Wastewater Facility, operated by the City of San Jose and a dry anaerobic food waste digestion facility, operated by ZeroWaste Energy Development Company. There have been improvements to air quality in Milpitas due to Air District actions with assistance from the community. However, odors continue to be a concern.

The South Bay Odor Stakeholder Group (SBOSG) was formed in 2015 to provide a transparent forum to address odors that affect the Milpitas community and discuss enforcement activities, permit and regulatory requirements, and odor mitigation and controls measures. Quarterly meetings are attended by community and industry stakeholders; Air District staff; staff representing the Chies of Fremont, Milpitas, and San Jose; staff representing Assemblymember Kansen Chu, Congressmar Ro, Khanna, and Senator Bob Wieckowski: and Rod Sinks, Stationary Source Committee Chair, representing Santa Clara County. Over the last year, the SBOSG has identified the need for an odor study to better understand the contribution of different odor sources in the Milpitas community.

DISCUSSION

In January 2019, the Air District committed to conduct an Odor Attribution Study to identify compounds from odor-producing facilities that are impacting Milpitas and nearby communities. The three facilities are located close together and have similar odor profiles. The proximity and similarity of the facilities has made it difficult to trace the odors experienced by community members to specific facilities, which is required for the Air District to be able to take regulatory or enforcement actions. The goal of the Odor Attribution Study is to determine the contribution and variability of odors from these facilities and measure how often and at what concentration

these odors may be passing into the local community to inform future actions to reduce odors.

The Air District released a Request for Proposals (RFP 2019-004 Odor Study) to identify contractors with the expertise to measure sources of odors from the landfill, transfer station, sewage treatment plant, compost, and organic waste processing operations in Milpitas. The proposals were scored based on expertise, skill, approach, cost, references, certified green business status, and local business status. Based on the proposal scoring and interviews, two complementary proposals were recommended for funding (Table 1). The Jacobs Engineering Group proposal exceeded the \$100,000 Administrative Code limit and was approved by the Air District Board of Directors on November 20, 2019.

The Montrose Environmental Group project is a shorter-term study, which will identify compounds of interest for longer-term study through the Jacobs Engineering Group study. Montrose Environmental Group's project will provide data on very low concentration (parts per trillion) trace chemical species and chemical markers. This highly advanced technical approach using Proton Transfer Reaction – Time of Flight – Mass Spectrometer (PTR-TOF-MS) can be used to develop chemical profiles contributing to the odors and enhance source attribution efforts.

The Jacobs Engineering Group project will identify odorant compounds impacting the area of concern via comprehensive quantitative and qualitative analyses and determine the relative contribution and variability of the odor-causing compounds emitted from the key source facilities. The study will take place over a minimum of three seasons and will include measurements at the facilities boundaries as well as in the community.

The Jacobs Engineering Group proposal includes five main tasks:

- Reviewing existing odor, concentration and meteorological data from previous studies
- Odor causing compound, contributor and masking effect identification
- Modeling source attribution of odorous releases based on compound identification results
- Develop a method to measure ongoing performance of the facilities at reducing odors
- Conduct public meetings for community members to receive regular updates on the results
 of the study

Staff have presented information about this project to the SBOSC and sought their input on the study. As part of this Agenda Item, staff will update the Board on the project and the specifics of the scopes of work for both companies.

BACKGROUND

The Bay Area Air Quality Management District (Air District) has participated in the Carl Moyer Program (CMP), in cooperation with the California Air Resources Board (CARB), since the program began in fiscal year ending (FYF) 1999. The CMP provides grants to public and private entities to reduce emissions of oxide of nitrogen (NOx), reactive organic gases (ROG), and particulate matter (PM) from existing heavy-duty engines by either replacing or retrofitting them. Eligible heavy-duty diesel engine applications include on-road trucks and buses, off-road equipment, marine ressels, loconorives, and stationary agricultural pump engines.

Assembly Fill (AB) 923 (Firebaugh), enacted in 2004 (codified as Health and Safety Code (HSC) Section 44225), authorized local air districts to increase their motor vehicle registration surcharge up to an additional \$2 per vehicle. The revenues from the additional \$2 surcharge are deposited in the Air District. Mobile Source Incentive Fund (MSIF). AB 923 stipulates that air districts may use the revenues generated by the additional \$2 surcharge for projects eligible under the CMP. On February 6, 2019, the Board of Directors (Board) authorized Air District participation in Year 21 of the CMP, and authorized the Executive Officer/APCO to execute Grant Agreements and amendments for projects funded with CMP funds or MSIF revenues, with individual grant award amounts up to \$100,000.

In 2017, AB 617 directed CARB, in conjunction with local air districts to establish the Community Air Protection Program. AB 617 provides a new community-focused action framework to improve air quality and reduce exposure to criteria air pollutants and toxic air contaminants in communities most impacted by air pollution. In advance of the development of the Community Air Protection Program, the Governor and legislature established an early action component to AB 617 to use existing incentive programs to get immediate emission reductions in the communities most affected by air pollution. AB 134 (2017) appropriated \$50 million from the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF) to reduce mobile source emissions including criteria pollutants, toxic air contaminants, and greenhouse gases in those communities within the Bay Area. Senate Bill (SB) 856 (2018) continued support for these project types and appropriated \$245 million from the GGRF statewide, of which \$40 million was awarded to the Air District for Bay Area emission reduction projects. These funds will be used to implement projects under the Community Health Protection grant program, CMP, and optionally on-road truck replacements under the Proposition 1B Goods Movement Emission Reduction Program. On April 3, 2019, the Board authorized the Air District to accept, obligate, and expend SB 856 grant funding.

In 1991, the California State Legislature authorized the Air District to impose a \$4 surcharge on motor vehicles registered within the nine-county Bay Area to fund projects that reduce on-road motor vehicle emissions within the Air District's inclination. The statutory authority for the Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) and requirements of the program are set forth in the HSC Sections 44241 and 44242. Sixty percent of TFCA funds are awarded by the Air District to eligible projects and programs implemented directly by the Air District (e.g., Spare the Air, electric vehicle charging station program) and to a program referred to as the TFCA Regional Fund. Each year, the Board allocates funding and adopts policies and evaluation criteria that govern the expenditure of TFCA Regional Fund monies. The remaining forty percent of TFCA funds are pass-through funds to the designated County Program Manager (CPM) in each of the nine counties within the Air District's jurisdiction.

On April 3, 2019, the Board authorized funding allocations for use of the sixty percent of the TFCA revenue in Fiscal Year Ending (FYE) 2020, cost-effectiveness limits for Air District-sponsored FYE 2020 programs, and the Executive Officer/APCO to execute grant agreements and amendments for TFCA-revenue tunded projects with individual grant award amounts up to \$100,000. On June 5, 2019, the Board adopted policies and evaluation criteria for the FYE 2020 TFCA Regional Fund program.

The Bay Area Clean Air Foundation (Foundation) is a nonprofit support organization for the Air District. As part of its operation, the Foundation applies for and accepts grant funding from various sources to reduce and offset air emissions within the Air District's boundaries. Under the terms of an executed contract between the Air District and Foundation, Air District staff administer grant programs and revenues awarded to the Foundation. On December 5, 2017, the Foundation entered into a contract with the Reformulated Gas Settlement Fund (RFG) administrators to receive approximately \$1.3 million in funding for a program to accelerate the adoption of zero- and near-zero-emission equipment and vehicles operating in and around the West Oakland community.

Projects with grant award amounts over \$100,000 are brought to the Mobile Source Committee for consideration at least on a quarterly basis. Staff reviews and evaluates grant applications based upon the respective governing policies and guidelines established by CARB, the Board and other funding agencies.

DISCUSSION

Carl Moyer Program and Community Health Protection Grant Program:

For the CMP Year 21 cycle, the Air District had more than \$11 million available for eligible CMP and school bus projects from a combination of MSIF and CMP funds. The Air District started accepting project applications for the CMP Year 21 funding cycle on June 17, 2019 and applications are accepted and evaluated on a first-come, first-served basis.

As of November 21, 2019, the Air District had received 99 project applications. Of the applications that have been evaluated between October 3, 2019 and November 21, 2019, one eligible project has a proposed grant award over \$100,000. This project will replace two (2) pieces of off-road agricultural equipment and will reduce over 0.84 tons of NOx, ROG and PM per year. Staff recommends the allocation of \$118,940 for this project from a combination of CMP funds and MSIF revenues. Attachment 1, Table 1, provides additional information on this project.

Attachment 2 lists all of the eligible projects that have been received by the Air District as of November 21, 2019, including information about the equipment category, award amounts, estimated emissions reductions, and county location. Approximately 81% of the funds have been awarded to projects that reduce emissions in highly impacted Bay Area communities. Attachment 4, Figures 4 and 5 summarize the cumulative allocation of CMP, MSIF, and Community Health Protection Grant Program funding since 2009 (more than \$292 million awarded to 1,249 projects).

Transportation Fund for Clean Air Program:

In FYE 2020, the Air District had approximately \$32 million in TFCA monies for eligible projects and programs. The An District opened the FYE 2020 Vehicle Trip Reduction Program and started accepting applications on August 9, 2019. As of November 21, 2019, the Air District had received 18 project applications to the Vehicle Trip Reduction Program. Staff also continued to evaluate project applications received through the FYE 2019 *Charge!* program.

Of the applications that were evaluated between October 3, 2019 and November 21, 2019, staff is proposing grant awards of over \$100,000 for five eligible TFCA projects. These projects will:

- Install and operate 18 single-port and 54 dual-port Level 2 charging stations;
- Support a rideshare project;
- Install 1.84 miles of class IV protected bikeways; and
- Install 44 electronic bicycle lockers.

Staff recommends the allocation of \$1,004,900 that, in total, is estimated to reduce over 1.17 tons of NOx, ROG and PM per year. Attachment 1, Table 2, provides additional information.

Attachment 3, Table 1, lists all eligible TFCA projects that have been evaluated and awarded between July 1, 2019 and November 21, 2019, including information about the equipment category, award amounts, estimated emissions reductions, and county location. Approximately 43% of the funds have been awarded to projects that reduce emissions in highly impacted Bay Area communities.

Reformulated Gas Settlement Fund Program:

Under contract to the Foundation, the Air District has been administering the West Oakland Zero-Emission Grant Program, that had approximately \$1.17 million in RFG funding for eligible projects to reduce petroleum usage and air pollution in West Oakland and nearby communities surrounding the Port of Oakland.

Of the applications that were evaluated between October 3, 2019 and November 21, 2019, none of the eligible projects proposed an individual grant award over \$100 000. However, two eligible RFG project were awarded less than \$100,000 during this evaluation period and these projects are listed in Attachment 3, Table 2. This table also lists all other eligible RFG projects that were evaluated and awarded as of November 21, 2019, including information about the equipment category, award amounts, estimated emissions reductions and location.

BUDGET CONSIDERATION / FINANCIAL IMPACT

None. The Air District distributes CMP, MSIF, Community Health Protection Grant Program, TFCA, and RFG funding to project sponsors on a reimbursement basis. Funding for administrative costs is provided by each funding source.

Figure 2. Funding awarded in FYE 2020 by county




Figure 3. Funding awarded in FYE 2020 by project category includes funds awarded & recommended for award




Figure 4. CMP/MSIF/CHP/FARMER funding awarded since 2009 by county





Figure 5. CMP/MSIF/CHP/FARMER funding awarded since 2009 by category

BACKGROUND

In 1991, the California State Legislature authorized the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (Air District) to impose a \$4 surcharge on motor vehicles registered within the nine-county Bay Area to fund projects that reduce on-road motor vehicle emissions. Since 1992, the Air District has allocated these funds to its Transportation Fund for Clear Air (TFCA) Program to fund eligible projects and programs. The statutory authority for the TFCA and requirements of the program are set forth in California Health and Safety Code (HSC) Sections 44241 and 44242.

Sixty percent of TFCA funds are awarded by the Air District to eligible projects and programs implemented directly by the Air District (e.g., Spare the Air) and through a grant program known as the Regional Fund. The remaining 40% of TFCA funds are forwarded to the designated agency within each Bay Area county to be distributed via the County Program Manager Fund.

HSC Section 44242 requires that the Air District conduct an audit of projects and programs funded with TFCA monies, at least once every two years. The Air District audits Regional Fund projects and Air District-Sponsored programs annually and County Program Manager Fund projects biennially. On October 4, 2017, the Air District's Board of Directors (Board) approved the award of a contract to Simpson & Simpson, LLP for audit services, including a financial and compliance review of TFCA funded projects and programs.

DISCUSSION

The Audit Summary Report, included as Attachment 1, summarizes the results of TFCA Audit #20. In total, Simpson & Simpson, LLP conducted financial and compliance audits of 43 TFCA projects, which include Regional Fund projects and Air District-sponsored programs completed prior to June 30, 2019, and a review of the Air District's administrative expense of TFCA funds incurred between July 1, 2017 and June 30, 2018. A list of these projects is available in Appendix B of the attached report. **No findings were identified during this audit.**

Audit field work was conducted by Simpson & Simpson, LLP during the months of March 2019 through November 2019. Following the completion of field work, Simpson & Simpson, LLP issued a draft audit report to each of the project sponsors and offered an opportunity to those with any preliminary findings to provide a management response.

In addition to conducting the financial and compliance audits, Simpson & Simpson, LLP also performed a review of Agreed-Upon Procedures (AUP) to verify project sponsors' compliance with other aspects of the TFCA Funding Agreement, including that:

- 1. Expenditures are properly supported;
- 2. Administrative expenses are appropriately documented;
- 3. Use of an indirect cost rate is consistent with the Air District Guidelines;
- 4. Appropriate resolutions authorizing the grant application are adopted or, where applicable, an authorizing letter of commitment is included;
- 5. Required reports are submitted on time and contained all information required;
- 6. The Air District is acknowledged as a project funder and
- 7. Matching Funds requirements are met or exceed a.

The results of the review were included in a separate AUP Report, which is being reviewed internally by the Air District.

None. Administrative costs for the TFCA audit and staff are provided by the funding source.

BACKGROUND

In 1991, the California State Legislature authorized the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (Air District) to impose a \$4 surcharge on motor vehicles registered within the nine-county Bay Area to fund projects that reduce on-road motor vehicle emissions. Since 1992, the Air District has allocated these funds to its Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) Program to fund eligible projects and programs. The statutory authority for the TFCA and requirements of the program are set forth in California Health and Safety Code (HSC) Sections 44241 and 44242.

Sixty percent of TFCA funds are awarded by the Air District to eligible projects and programs implemented directly by the Air District (e.g., Spare the Air and Commuter Benefits Program) and through a grant program known as the Regional Fund. The remaining 40% of TFCA funds are forwarded to a designated agency ("County Program Manager") within each Bay Area county to be distributed via the County Program Manager Fund.

HSC Section 44241 requires that the Board hold a public hearing each year to review the Air District's expenditure of TFCA funds to determine their effectiveness in improving air quality. Additionally, County Program Managers are required to hold a public hearing each year to review their expenditure of TFCA funds.

DISCUSSION

The FYE 2019 Report on TFCA Projects Expenditures and Effectiveness, found in Attachment 1, evaluated a total of 44 projects that were completed prior to June 30, 2019, and three programs.

The following are key findings of the FYE 2019 report:

- TFCA funds were allocated to eligible projects and programs, consistent with the legislation that authorizes the TFCA program.
- The TFCA expenditures for projects and programs totaled \$6.01 million. This includes \$2.72 million in Regional Fund projects, \$2.23 million in Air District-sponsored programs, and \$1.06 million in administrative and indirect costs.
- Twenty-nine percent of TFCA Regional Fund expenditures went to projects in communities identified as cumulative impact areas by the Air District's Community Air Risk Evaluation (CARE) Program.
- During their operational period, the projects and programs reduced criteria pollutant emissions by an estimated 85.86 tons, including 22.64 tons of reactive organic gases (ROG), 19.88 tons of nitrogen oxides (NOx), and 43.34 tons of particulate matter (PM₁₀) and reduced emissions of carbon dioxide (CO₂) by over 52,900 tons.

A discussion of the expenditures, emission reductions, and cost-effectiveness of these TFCA Regional Fund projects and Air District-sponsored programs will be presented at the Committee meeting.

BUDGET CONSIDERATION / FINANCIAL IMPACT

None. The Air District distributes TFCA ponies as "pass-through" funds to public and nonpublic entities. Administrative costs for project staff are provided by the Air District's TFCA funding.

THE BAY AREA AIR QUALITY MANAGEMENT DISTRICT

The California State Legislature created the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (Air District) in 1955 as the first regional air pollution control agency in the country, recognizing that air pollution transcends political boundaries. The San Francisco Bay Area forms a regional air basin, sharing common geographical features and weather patterns, and therefore similar air pollution burdens, which cannot be addressed by counties acting on their own.

The Air District is the public agency entrusted with regulating stationary sources of air pollution in the nine counties that surround San Francisco Bay: Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Napa, San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, southwestern Solano, and southern Sonoma counties.

BACKGROUND

On-road motor vehicles, including cars, trucks, and buses, constitute the most significant source of air pollution in the San Francisco Bay Area. Vehicle emissions contribute to unhealthful levels of ozone (summertime "smog"), particulate matter, and greenhouse gases. Because of this, emission reductions from the on-road transportation sector are essential to helping the region attain State and Federal ambient air quality standards and meet greenhouse gas reduction commitments.

To protect public health, the California State Legislature enacted the California Clean Air Act in 1988. As part of the requirements, the Air District prepared and adorted the 2017 Clean Air Plan, which includes transportation control measures, defined as any strategy "to reduce vehicle trips, vehicle use, vehicle miles traveled, vehicle idling, or traffic congestion for reducing motor vehicle emissions," and mobile source measures, which encourage the introduction of newer, cleaner motor vehicle technologies and the retirement of older, more polluting vehicles.

THE TRANSPORTATION FUND FOR CLEAN AIR

In 1991, the California State Legislature authorized the Air District to impose a \$4 surcharge on motor vehicles registered within the San Francisco Bay Are a to fund projects that reduce on-road motor vehicle emissions. The Air District has allocated these funds to its Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) to fund eligible projects. The statutory authority for the TFCA and requirements of the program are set forth in California Health and Salety Code (HSC) Sections 44241 and 44242.

Sixty percent of TFCA funds are awarded by the Air District's Board of Directors (Board) to eligible projects and programs implemented directly by the Air District (e.g., Commuter Benefits, Vehicle Buy-Back, and Spare the Air) and through a grant program known as the Regional Fund. The remaining forty percent of TFCA funds are pass-through funds to a designated agency within each Bay Area county to be distributed via the County Program Manager Fund. Each year, the Board adopts cost-effectiveness and other criteria for the evaluation and ranking of project applications for the TFCA Program.

In addition to reducing air pollution, including toxic diesel particulate matter, TFCA-funded projects have other benefits including the following:

- Conserving energy and helping to reduce emissions of carbon dioxide (CO₂);
- Reducing traffic congestion;

- Improving quality of life for residents and commuters by expanding access to services that provide first- and last-mile connections to rail, ferry, and mass transit; and
- Improving physical fitness and public safety by facilitating active modes of transportation such as walking and biking.

State legislation restricts TFCA funding to the following 11 categories of projects:

- 1. Implementation of ridesharing programs
- 2. Clean fuel school and transit bus purchases or leases
- 3. Feeder bus or shuttle service to rail/ferry stations and airports
- 4. Arterial traffic management
- 5. Rail-bus integration and regional transit information systems
- 6. Demonstrations in congestion pricing of highways, bridges and public transit
- 7. Low-emission vehicle projects
- 8. A smoking vehicles program
- 9. A vehicle buy-back scrappage program
- 10. Bicycle facility improvement projects
- 11. Physical improvements that support "smart growth" projects

California HSC Section 44241.5 requires the Board to hold a public hearing annually to review the expenditure of revenues received by the Air District pursuant to Section 44241 to determine their effectiveness in improving air quality. This report serves this purpose.

FYE 2019 SUMMARY

This report summarizes the *expenditures* and *effectiveness* of the 44 Regional Fund projects and 3 Air District-sponsored programs that were completed as of the end of fiscal year ending (FYE) 2019 – which was June 30, 2019 – and that were not included in previous reports. **Appendix A** lists the each of the Regional Fund projects and Air District sponsored programs that were summarized as part of this report.

¹ For the purpose of this report, staff considers a project to be "completed" when the Air District accepts and approves the project sponsor's final invoice, which documents the project sponsor's expenditure of all eligible project funds and the completion of transportation services or all initial project milestones (e.g., having procured, installed and/or placed all project-related vehicles, equipment, and infrastructure into service). Projects that involve the procurement of equipment/vehicles and construction of infrastructure typically also require continued operation of the funded equipment, vehicles, or infrastructure. These projects may continue to operate for several years after the final invoice is accepted and approved – until the operational and usage requirements are met.

Key Highlights of the Projects and Programs Included in this Report

- TFCA funds were expended on eligible projects and programs, consistent with the legislation that authorizes the TFCA program.
- The TFCA expenditures for projects and programs totaled \$6.01 million. These expenditures include \$2.72 million in Regional Fund projects, \$2.23 million in Air District-sponsored programs, and \$1.06 million in administrative and indirect costs.
- 29% of TFCA Regional Fund expenditures went to projects in communities identified as *cumulative impact areas* by the Air District's Community Air Risk Evaluation (CARE) Program.
- During their operational periods, the projects and programs reduced criteria pollutant emissions by an estimated 85.86 tons, including 22.64 tons of reactive organic gases (ROG), 19.88 tons of nitrogen oxides (NO_x), and 43.34 tons of particulate matter (PM₁₀) and reduced emissions of carbon dioxide (CO₂), by over 52,900 tons.

EXPENDITURES

The expenditure of these projects and programs total approximately \$5.01 million. This total includes \$2.72 million for the programs administered directly by the Air District and \$2.23 million in Regional Fund grants to other organizations. In addition, the Air District expended about \$1.06 million in administrative and audit costs associated with the oversight of the TFCA program in FYE 2019.




Figure 1. Summary of FYI 2019 Expenditures

A summary of the expenditures for these TFCA Regional Fund projects and Air District-sponsored programs is shown in **Figure 1**.

EFFECTIVENESS

The cost-effectiveness of a project or program is calculated by dividing the amount of TFCA funds assigned to the project (awarded or expended) by the sum of criteria pollutant emissions (ROG, NO_X , and weighted PM_{10}) reduced by the project during its operational period. Therefore, Projects with a lower value for cost-effectiveness require less TFCA funds to reduce one ton of criteria emissions. Typically, relatively cost-effective

projects are highly utilized, involve the operation of zero-emission vehicles, are located in densely-populated areas or near activity centers or mass transit hubs, and/or are supported with relatively high percentages of matching funds.

Projects and programs included in this report will reduce criteria pollutant emissions over their operational periods by an estimated total of 85.86 tons. This total is the sum of ozone precursors (22.64 tons of ROG and 19.88 tons of NO_x) and particulate matter (43.34 tons of PM_{10}). These projects and programs will also reduce CO_2 emissions over their operational periods by an estimated 52,900 tons.²

The combined weighted-average cost-effectiveness of the projects and programs reported for FYE 2019 is \$51,397 per ton of criteria pollutant emissions reduced. Many projects continue to operate and reduce emissions even after their operational periods ended; these projects have the potential to be more cost-effective (i.e. lower cost per ton of emissions reduced) in reducing emissions than what is presented in this report.

A summary of expenditures, emission reductions, and cost-effectiveness values by program category is provided in **Table 1**.

The combined weighted-average cost-effectiveness of the projects and programs reported in FYE 2019 is a 9% improvement from FYE 2018. This difference is due, in part, to a portfolio of electric vehicle infrastructure projects in FYE 2018 that had taken advantage of higher funding amounts available for electric infrastructure projects that are co-sited with solar generation. These projects resulted in higher cost-effectiveness values (less cost-effective), but also achieved additional greenhouse gas benefits that are not accounted for in the cost-effectiveness evaluation for TFCA funded projects. The variation of combined weighted-average cost-

effectiveness from year to year is primarily due to that fact that different types of projects that have different cost-effectiveness limits were completed and included in the cost-effectiveness evaluation each year.

One Regional Fund project listed in Appendix A did not meet the cost-effectiveness threshold of its respective program at the conclusion of its operational period. Below is a discussion on the performance of this project, which resulted in a higher than expected cost-effectiveness value.

Discussion: The cost-effectiveness limit for FYE 2016 Regional Ridesharing Services projects was \$90,000 per ton of emissions reductions. The project was evaluated on four services proposed by the Project Sponsor: matchlists, placement calls, forming new vanpools, and partnering with ride-matching apps. Because this was an existing program, the estimated cost-effectiveness and actual cost-effectiveness of this project were calculated based on survey results provided by the Project Sponsor. The reduction in cost-effectiveness of the project is due, in part, to a reduction in commuter utilization of the Project's matchlists and placement call components relative to previous years. Results of this project informed the Project Sponsor's shift to offering incentives that support vanpooling and carpooling.

Re: Policy to Prohibit Use of Air District Funds on Vehicles Manufactured by Companies

that Oppose California's Regulation of Light-Duty Vehicle Emissions

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommend the Board of Directors direct Air District staff to develop a policy that prohibits Air District incentive and general funds from being used for the purchase of light-duty vehicles manufactured by companies that oppose the State of California's right to regulate light-duty vehicle emissions.

BACKGROUND

On November 15, 2019, the Californic Department of General Services (DGS) announced two new policies that aim to maximize reductions of greer house gas (GHG) emissions under Executive Order N-19-19. The first policy will prohibit purchasing by state agencies of any sedans solely powered by an internal combuttion engine, with exemptions for certain public safety vehicles. The second, which is currently being developed by DGS, will require state agencies, starting on January 1, 2020, to only purchase vehicles from Original Equipment Manufacturers (OEMs) that recognize the California Air Resources Board's (CARB) authority to set GHG and zero emission vehicle standards (ZEV), and which have committed to continuing stringent emissions reduction goals for their fleets.

As of November 15, 2019, the decision affects the following 12 companies who have joined the Trump administration in disrupting California's authority:

DISCUSSION

The Air District funds the procurement of new light-duty cars both directly, for the replacement of its own vehicle fleet, and indirectly, through its award of incentive funds programs. At the Committee meeting, staff will discuss a proposal for the Air District to adopt policies that would prohibit use of its incentive and general fund monies to purchase vehicles manufactured by carmakers that oppose California's regulatory authority.

BUDGET CONSIDERATION / FINANCIAL IMPACT

At this time the estimated cost impact is projected to be small, although reduced availability of clean vehicles may lead to higher costs for fleet purchases.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommend the Board of Directors authorize the Executive Officer/APCO to increase an existing contract with CSE in an amount not to exceed \$5,000 for services performed in Fiscal Year Ending (FYE) 2019 and FYE 2020 for Electric Vehicle (EV) market research services.

BACKGROUND

Following approval by the Board of Directors on May 1, 2019, the Air District entered into an agreement with the CSE to collect and analyze qualitative and quantitative data on consumer and business sentiments regarding barriers to EV adoption and the installation of EV charging infrastructure. This data will help the Air District tailor and strengthen outreach messages, educational materials, and incentive programs to increase EV adoption in the Bay Area. The executed contract amount was \$113,677.

DISCUSSION

Following an analysis of stakeholder needs and Bay Area population demographics, staff concluded that a larger survey size is necessary to provide sufficient granularity to draw county-level conclusions. This additional data will allow partners at the county and local levels to use the Air District's work to inform their programs and policies. Expanding the survey sample size from 500 to 1,000 respondents will require an additional cost not to exceed \$5,000.

BUDGET CONSIDERATION / FINANCIAL IMPACT

None. Funding for these contracts comes from a grant from the Federal Highway Administration and California Department of Transportation, through the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ) Program.
