What is the CAC?

The CAC is the Community Advisory Council that was approved by the Board of Directors on November 17th, 2021.

The CAC advises and consults with the Board of Directors and the Executive Officer on community related matters and environmental justice issues.

The Council also exercises its own initiative in selecting areas for exploration and study.



Who is represented in the CAC?

- The CAC is composed of 17 members
- All 17 members represent the Bay Area
- The counties are: Solano, Contra Costa, San Francisco, Alameda, San Mateo, Santa Clara.
- We also have 2 members representing "at large" and 2 youth representatives.



Community Advisory Council Co-Chair Duties



Provide leadership, stewardship, and oversight of the Community Advisory Council (CAC)

Collaborate with Council Members to set meeting agendas

Oversee the activities of the CAC Ad Hoc Committees

Ensure decisions are made in a democratic, equitable and timely manner

Guide, prioritize, and oversee the activities of the CAC Representing the CAC and liaising with the Board

The goal of the CAC

- One of the many goals the CAC Co-Chairs would like to accomplish is fulfilling the promise of selecting a Board member to serve as a liaison to the CAC.
- On March 3rd, 2022, The Community Equity, Health, & Justice Committee held a meeting and one of the agenda items was an update on the CAC.
- During this meeting, Suma Peesapati stressed the need for the CAC to establish a relationship with the Board.
- As part of that discussion, the question was posed if the CAC would like a liaison from the Board.



Who will serve as a Liaison from the Board?



- The importance of designating a liaison from the Board was a top priority.
- The liaison will be a progressive Board member who has excellent communication skills, showing genuine interest in resolving environmental justice issues and concerns within the community.
- Connecting the community with the Board to establish trust by conflict resolution and problem-solving.

Status of the Board Liaison

On September 19th, 2022, there was a meeting with Board Leadership.

I expressed to the leadership of the Board the importance of selecting a liaison for the CAC and why the role of the liaison is important to the community.

Since the meeting, there has not been any follow-ups from the Board nor an update about the process of selecting a Board member to serve as the CAC's liaison.



Next Steps

- We are awaiting a designated liaison from the Board.
- The CAC Co-Chairs request for a member of the Community, Health, and Justice Committee to serve as the liaison.
- Meet with the leadership of the Board to move forward with a liaison.
- The CAC would also like to select a member of our council to report updates to the Board during their meetings.

Strategy: Reducing pollution at home

Facilitater: Lily

Summarize: This strategy includes expanding home retrofit programs, addressing housing standards for renters, and helping the unhoused reduce air pollution exposure.

Questions: What types of action can we take to help protect the unhoused who often live near freeways?

Do you have any concerns about requiring homeowners and/or landlords to do retrofits and provide air filtration and cooling?

How could we address those concerns?

each jurisdiction adopt ordinances in general plan to make this happen

Richmond Public Housing properties must be considered as well. - focus on **HUD** properties

programs for landlords in certain census blocks

High efficiency heat pumps provide cooling and filtration and are low cost to operate. We can provide additional information that the Air District and others have been working on steadily and surely to eliminate natural gas

Not sure if solar panels fit here but encouraging them for homes would be great. I know there is a free solar panel program but unfortunately is not available for renters.

lean more onto incentives and grants that ease the cost

need better understanding of current laws - city of require landlords to retrofit - county should have an inspection program Consider approaching health care providers like Kaiser to designate air filtration as prescriptive.

expanding existing retrofit programs for certain census blocks

small mom and pop landlords will be burdened by this issue - this is not a problem they created

regulate upkeeping of home, can renter afford that if these costs get pushed onto them?

helping landlords would be most beneficial because they would most likely participate

<---- How can we expand the program so renters in Richmond have the opportunity to get solar panels?

Financial support/grants for landlords to upgrade air filtration systems

incentives such as replacing wood burning stoves

affordable relatively-comfortable housing units

Address homelessness/housin g insecurity with long-term strategies for sustainable housed conditions

Richmond's rent control program already puts fees on landlords as well as limits on rent increases. Other things will be on top

Future urban planning must be considered. require air filtration in new huildings

electrify buildings - get rid of gas burning stoves for cooking








Path to Clean Air Community Air Monitoring Plan (CAMP)





- CAMP Community Steering Committee (CSC) selected an air toxics monitoring project and identified facilities of concern and nearby communities with high health burdens (July 2020)
- Completed data collection and initial analysis (October 2022)
- Monitoring Outreach Team, a subset CAMP CSC, reviewed results (October 2022)
- Results will be published as online story map (with language translation) and more detailed technical documents to follow
- Air District is reviewing results to identify actions for further investigation and/or to reduce emissions

East Oakland Community Emissions Reduction Plan



- East Oakland Community Emissions Reduction Plan (CERP)
 - Co-Lead Partner: Communities for a Better Environment (CBE)
 - Partnered to develop the successful nomination of East Oakland to CARB for a CERP process
 - Co-developed effort to outreach and establish an East Oakland Community Steering Committee (CSC) to guide CERP development
 - Co-Lead the CERP process and strategy development
 - Facilitator: Just Cities, LLC
 - With CBE's support, Just Cities contracted to provide administrative, logistical, and co-facilitation support to the East Oakland CSC, along with capacity-building training for Air District, CBE and CSC members

East Oakland Community Steering Committee



- Review Committee comprised of CBE and Air District staff
- Determined the composition of the East Oakland CSC (see table)
- Reviewed applications after two months of outreach and selected a 26-member CSC


