

Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA)



 Statutory authority set forth in California Health and Safety Code Sections 44241 and 44242

- Funding provided by a \$4 surcharge on motor vehicles
- \$29.5 million available for distribution through 60% Fund in FYE 2024



Reformulated Gas Settlement Funds (RFG) Zero-Emission Grant Program



- Total Project Funding = \$1.2 million
- Awarded to the Bay Area Clean Air Foundation from RFG in 2017 to expedite reductions in petroleum usage in and around West Oakland and adjacent 617 communities along the I-80 corridor, including Richmond and Western Alameda County
- Most funds awarded to projects 2018 2020, and due to fallout from projects cancelling, approximately \$400,000 available for award in 2023

Proposed Projects



Recommend \$9,120,905 in awards for four projects that will:

- Install 295 electric charging stations to support electric school buses serving schools in Alameda and San Francisco counties
- Replace 27 diesel heavy-duty trucks with electric trucks and install 27 charging stations
- Replace 13 large-spark ignition airport ground support units with zero-emissions units at SFO





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Action Items



Recommend that the Board of Directors:

- Authorize the Air District to accept, obligate, and expend new fiscal year 2023-2024 State funds from California Air Resources Board (CARB) for the Funding Agricultural Reduction Measures for Emission Reductions (FARMER) Program, up to \$3.4 million;
- Adopt a resolution authorizing the Air District's participation in the FARMER program; and
- Authorize the Executive Officer/APCO to enter into all agreements necessary to accept, obligate, and expend this funding, and to execute grant agreements and amendments for projects with individual grant award amounts up to \$500,000

FARMER Program



- Created in 2017 to reduce emissions from the agricultural sector
- Voluntary program that funds emission reductions beyond regulatory requirements
- Replaces and upgrades highly polluting agricultural equipment with cleaner options





FARMER Year 23-24 Funding



- \$75 million available statewide
 - \$1.325 million tentatively proposed for Bay Area
 - Requesting additional \$2 million if funds become available
- Up to 6.25% may be used for administrative costs
- Projects subject to CARB adopted 2018 FARMER Program Guidelines
- Funding will be awarded between 2023 2024 and all projects must be completed and paid out (liquidated) by 6/30/2027

Requested Actions



Recommend that the Board of Directors:

- Authorize the Air District to accept, obligate, and expend new fiscal year 2023-2024 State funds from CARB for the FARMER Program, up to \$3.4 million;
- Adopt a resolution authorizing the Air District's participation in the FARMER program; and

- Approve the proposed cost-effectiveness limit to enable Alameda County Transportation Commission (Alameda CTC) to award FYE 2024 TFCA 40% funds to an arterial management project, as shown in Table 1.



Background




- Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) funding program authorized in 1991 by State Legislature to help air districts reduce on-road mobile source emissions
- \$4 motor vehicle registration surcharge fee with 40% of funds distributed to the nine Bay Area congestion management agencies
- Annually, staff brings recommended updates to TFCA 40% Fund policies to Air District Board of Directors (Board) for consideration



Timeline for Update to FYE 2025 Policies







Community Advisory Council (CAC) met on May 18, 2023, and provided feedback and questions about the 40% fund. Staff is working to address questions and feedback:

- In July staff met with administering agencies to discuss process for receiving input from CAC members and increasing transparency
- Meetings have been scheduled with CAC members and administering agencies
- Staff will be working with the administering agencies to add new reporting requirements

Summary of Proposed Updates for FYE 2025



- Include a cost-effectiveness limit for projects that request a case-bycase review under Policy #3.
- Remove On-Road Truck Replacement (Policy #25) -- this category no longer provides surplus emission reductions.
- Expand the definition of Priority Areas to also include Assembly Bill 617 communities, Priority Populations defined by SB 535 disadvantaged communities and AB 1550 low-income communities.
- Continue providing subgrantees with up to 24 months to commence their projects (policy #6) and clarify that this flexibility also applies to projects that are directly sponsored by administering agencies.

Summary of Proposed Updates for FYE 2025 (cont.)

- Simplify the design guidelines so that local and state standards would need to be followed for bikeways (policy #30).
- Allow upgrading a Class III and Class II (non-buffered bikeway) to a Class II buffered bike lane as an eligible project type (Policy #30).
- Clarify what qualifies as an Infrastructure Improvement for Trip Reduction Project (Policy #33).

Next Steps for Future Cycles



Continue coordinating with administering agencies on program refinements:

- Evaluate C/E limit for select project categories
- Review mechanisms for project administration
- Provide further guidance on evaluation of projects
- Add new reporting requirements for greater transparency on process for awarding funds, how equity is addressed, and opportunities for community participation

Winton Ave/D St and Tennyson Road Corridors Signal Timing:

Purchase and install adaptive/actuated equipment for an estimated 17 intersections including: upgrades to support adaptive timing, communications upgrades, and video detection upgrades

TFCA 40% Funds Proposed for Award by Alameda CTC: \$515,000

Estimated Total Project Cost: \$812,600

Proposed Project Cost-Effectiveness Limit: \$250,000/ton
