#### **RECOMMENDED ACTION**

#### BACKGROUND

Residential wood combustion is a significant source of fine particulate matter ( $PM_{2.5}$ ) emissions in the Bay Area, especially during winter months. Woodsmoke also contains gaseous air toxics, including benzene. Air District staff are working to understand the air quality health impacts of woodsmoke with efforts that include emissions inventory improvements, analysis of ambient measurement data, and air quality modeling. Staff are also exploring options for mitigating woodsmoke impacts, including incentive programs and regulatory approaches. Preliminary findings from recent technical analyses are presented, along with information on incentive programs and rule-making efforts.

#### DISCUSSION

Residential wood combustion accounts for about 16% of annual  $PM_{2.5}$  emissions in the Bay Area, and about one-third of direct  $PM_{2.5}$  emissions on an average winter day. Because woodsmoke also contains gaseous air toxics such as benzene, understanding and mitigating the impacts of this source sector is important from a human health perspective and for complying with ambient air quality standards for  $PM_{2.5}$ . Assessing these impacts presents unique challenges due to the variety of devices used to burn wood, the seasonal nature of woodburning activities, the difficulty in characterizing the spatial distribution of woodsmoke emissions, and other factors.

The Air District has recently contracted with Baseline Environmental to update our regional emissions inventory for residential wood combustion. Baseline analyzed results from winter Spare the Air (STA) surveys conducted by the Air District from 2004-2020, with a focus on survey questions pertaining to woodburning device ownership and usage. Key parameters for estimating emissions include county-level device populations, wood consumption rates, emission

factors, and the impact of control programs like STA. The final 2019 emissions inventory for residential wood combustion showed that this source sector emits about 5.7 tons per day of  $PM_{2.5}$  on an annual average basis and about 16.5 tons per day of  $PM_{2.5}$  during peak winter months (Dec-Jan). Compared with a 2011 inventory developed by District staff, woodsmoke emissions have decreased by about 25%, mostly due to decreases in fireplace populations and usage.

Analysis of ambient monitoring data can be used to assess the impact of woodsmoke emissions and to investigate spatial and temporal patterns in woodburning activity. For example, analysis of black carbon (BC) data from the Forest Knolls monitoring site in western Marin County shows peak BC levels that are similar to those measured near a busy roadway. These peak levels happen during evening hours when woodburning activity is most likely occurring. Analysis of other types of monitoring data, such as speciated PM<sub>2.5</sub> measurements, can also be used to assess potential patterns in woodsmoke emissions.

Air District staff are also conducting air quality modeling analyses to assess the air quality and health impacts of  $PM_{2.5}$  emissions from residential wood combustion. Using techniques previously applied to evaluate impacts from refinery fluidized catalytic cracking units for amendments to Rule 6-5 and from natural gas-fueled appliances for amendments to Rules 9-4 and 9-6, preliminary modeling was conducted for a number of scenarios with different  $PM_{2.5}$ emissions levels and spatial distributions of emissions. Preliminary results from applications of U.S. EPA's health benefits model (BenMAP) showed that  $PM_{2.5}$  emissions from residential wood combustion in the Bay Area could be responsible for 160 or more premature deaths annually. For comparison, modeled benefits of eliminating primary and secondary  $PM_{2.5}$ generated by natural gas-fired combustion from the building appliances targeted by proposed amendments to Rules 9-4 and 9-6 included avoiding 37 to 85 premature deaths annually.

To mitigate the impact of woodsmoke emissions, the Air District has historically relied on a variety of approaches, including regulatory efforts such as the Spare the Air Program and incentive programs that fund the replacement of woodburning devices with natural gas-fueled options or EPA certified woodstoves and pellet stoves. This presentation will summarize past incentive programs and introduce the Clean Heating Efficiently with Electric Technology, Program (Clean HEET), which will offer \$2 million to homeowners to replace operating and heating wood stoves and wood-burning fireplace inserts with electric heat pumps. Mitigation information will also include a review of Rule 6-3 on woodburning devices and plans for exploring amendments to this rule and other policy options.

This rule development process will include the drafting of a white paper that documents current knowledge about this source type and provides decision-making context and recommendations on potential policy responses. This white paper will be informed by ongoing technical assessments, including additional analyses of ambient monitoring data, revised spatial distributions of woodsmoke emissions, and updated air quality modeling simulations.

To conclude this agenda item, staff will engage Committee members in a discussion of potential impacts of woodsmoke emissions and policy options for mitigating those impacts.
