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Permissive burn periods for orchard pruning and attrition fires and forest management fires open

SAN FRANCISCO - The Bay Area Air Quality Management District is announcing that the open burning seasons for orchard pruning and attrition fires and for forest management fires is open through April 30, 2018.

Under Air District policy, permissive BURN days will not be declared when a *Winter Spare the Air Alert* is in effect. Residents in Napa and Sonoma counties are recommended to contact the Regional Resource Centers for the North Bay wildfires to see if there are broader programs to deal with agricultural waste.

Orchard pruning and attrition fires are agricultural fires set for the purpose of disposing of periodic prunings or attrition losses from fruit trees, nut trees, vineyards and cane fruits. These fires must be set or allowed by the public fire official having jurisdiction. They are necessary to maintain and continue the growing of fruit trees, vineyards and cane fruits in productive croplands. Notification of these burns and notification fee payments must be sent to the Air District prior to burning.

Forest management fires are set for the purpose of removing forest debris and for other forest management activities. They must be set or allowed by a public fire official having jurisdiction. Notification of these burns and notification fee payments must be made to the Air District prior to burning.

Forest management fires that are expected to exceed 10 acres in size, or to burn piled vegetation from more than 10 acres of land, are regulated as wildland vegetation management fires and are allowed year-round. These cannot be set without a Smoke Management Plan, which must be submitted to the Air District 30 days in advance of the planned burn and approved. An acreage burning allocation must also be received from the Air District each day before the start of any fire.

Prospective burners should also check with their local fire agencies or Cal Fire for local permitting and fire safety requirements.

Open burning is regulated because of its impact on air quality. Certain fires for agricultural purposes, flood control, fire training and the prevention of fire hazards, among other purposes, are allowed when weather conditions are favorable for smoke dispersion, many of them during specified periods throughout the year. Each day of the year is designated as either a BURN or a NO BURN day, and permissible fires can only be set during their established burn season on a designated BURN day.

Open burning requirements apply to the nine-county Bay Area region, including Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Napa, San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, southwestern Solano and southern Sonoma counties.
